THE VISION SO FAR

Mark outlined his thoughts for the use of a field at Yew Tree Farm for a community orchard. He would like to offer a piece of land, about 100m x 30m for the development of an orchard for community use. The field also includes a stream, a newly-renovated pond and mixed hazel hedging.

Mark would anticipate there being some kind of membership agreement – to be debated.

Mark spoke about the probable need to fence against deer.

Range of old variety apples, pears, plums, greengages damsons and soft fruit Donate a walnut (Paul and Isa) (NB would need careful planting so as not to shadow others) Mulberry (black) Sweet chestnut Cider apples; crab apples Quince (proper ones) Cherries Natural grassland (not seeded grass) Soft fruit under-storey Spiny hedges – hawthorn? To keep the deer off Bramley and other cooking apples Mistletoe

Sharing costs:

Share cost of fencing etc Everyone pay for a tree or two Maybe £10 annual membership Card to prove membership Launch party – introduce members to one another How to work out fair distribution of produce?

Other thoughts:

Fully organic Option for storage Juicing days if abundant fruit Bench to sit on among the trees Chatting, swing, seats Working class – pruning Pruning day Wassailing Apple Day Tree Dressing Day Planting parties/picnics Trees dedicated to e.g. grandchildren What size trees – mixture of small and standards Not too long a season to maintain some privacy for Mark and Gwen Only mow pathways through land to encourage wild flowers and insects Contact Gloucestershire Orchard Group for advice (funding, varieties, etc) Need to think of layout of trees Pattern of light

Translocation from canal to pond Let the pond naturalise Plant in stages, maybe 20 trees per year Sheep to graze Lion poo to deter deer?
